

1. Development of the Society

1.1. Membership

We are delighted to welcome 55 new members (8 Life Members, 8 Regular Members, 3 Affiliated Members, and 36 Student Members) who joined the Society this year and very pleased to see the rapid growth of the Society's membership. We have totally 101 new members in these two years.

2. New Features

2.1. LSHK server accessible to the mainland

Thanks to the contributions made by our Vice-President Vicky MAN, our website is now accessible to people in the mainland of China. We hope that our website can become a more reliable source to our local members, the linguists in the mainland of China, and the international linguistics community for information exchange purposes.

2.2. E-newsletters

To facilitate effective academic discussions among our members over the internet, we published two issues of the e-newsletter in February and October, respectively, and posted them on our website.

3. Activities

3.1. LSHK Workshop on Cantonese

We had two WOCs in 2009. The 8th LSHK Workshop on Cantonese (WOC-8) was organized on March 28 at the Chinese University of Hong Kong and the theme was 'Grammar of Hong Kong Ciu4jyu5'. Selected papers from WOC-8 will be published in *Chinese Language Studies* (《中國語文研究》). The 9th LSHK Workshop on Cantonese (WOC-9) was organized on November 14 at the Hong Kong University of Science and Technology and the theme was 'Representation and Standardization of Cantonese Sounds: Romanization and Standard Pronunciations'. The WOC-9 was co-sponsored by the Center of Chinese Linguistics at the Hong Kong University of Science and Technology and LangComp.

3.2. Cantonese romanization

3.2.1. Jyutping promotion group

Members of the Jyutping promotion group had a meeting with Mr. Dean Head, the author of *Fonetic Cantonese*, on the promotion of Jyutping on October 29 at The Hong Kong Polytechnic University to talk about the possibility of incorporating Jyutping and input from academics into Mr. Head's teaching materials.

3.2.2. Roundtable discussion on Jyutping promotion

A roundtable discussion on Jyutping promotion was organized during the 9th LSHK Workshop on Cantonese on November 14 at the Hong Kong University of Science and Technology.

3.3. Awards

3.3.1. LSHK Outstanding Thesis Awards

The award was presented to the winner at the opening ceremony of the 14th International Conference on Cantonese and Yue Dialects held in Guilin, Guangxi Zhuang Autonomous Region on December 7. 3.4. The 6th LSHK Postgraduate Research Forum on Linguistics

The Society initiated and organized the '6th LSHK Postgraduate Research Forum on Linguistics' (PRFL-6) held at The Hong Kong Polytechnic University on March 14-15, in conjunction with the 'Second PolyU Faculty of Humanities Postgraduate Research Symposium'. The theme of the PRFL-6 was 'East Asian Languages: Theory and Application'. The event began with a keynote speech from Prof. Chu-Ren HUANG titled 'From Lexical Semantics to Knowledge Systems: How to Infer Cognitive Systems from Corpus Data.' A total of 37 presentations were given by the presenters, who were from Hong Kong, the mainland of China, Taiwan, Korea, and Thailand.

Title: Count-mass Distinction and the Acquisition of Classifiers in Mandarin-speaking

Children

Abstract:

The count-mass distinction is traditionally regarded as a sub-categorization of nouns defined according to formal (morphological and syntactic) criteria. Whether a linguistic count-mass distinction exists in Chinese and how it should be analyzed have been subject to a variety of treatments (Chao 1968, Hansen 1983, Tai 1994, Kuo 2003, Tang 2005). In recent analyses of Chinese, some scholars argue that the distinction is lexically encoded: count nouns like *pingguo* 'apple' denote things naturally appearing in discrete, countable entities, while mass nouns like *shui* 'water' denote amorphous substances (Doetjes 1997, Cheng and Sybesma 1998, 1999). Furthermore, the count-mass distinction is also marked in the numeral classifier system, as only count nouns are selected by count classifiers (i.e., individual classifiers) while mass classifiers (non-individual classifiers) are unselective with respect to count or mass nouns. Alternatively, other scholars hold that nouns are cross-linguistically unmarked for either count or mass before being anchored to a dividing functional structure in syntax (Borer 2005).

How the count-mass distinction is acquired by children has received attention from philosophers and psychologists, who differ on whether they think it is syntax or semantics that initiates children into the distinction. On one view, it is argued that children may initially understand words such as *mama*, *apple* and *water* alike without individuating the referents, and it is the syntax of quantification that guides the child to the semantic differences between count and mass nouns (Quine 1960). On the other hand, language acquisition studies have shown that children rely on ontological properties of the referents of nouns when interpreting count nouns and mass nouns, quite independently of syntactic cues (Bloom 1990, Soja, Carey and Spelke 1991, Soja 1992).

In this thesis, we take the view that bare nouns in Chinese are unspecified in number and individuation, and the representation of individuals in Chinese is achieved via the numeral classifier system, a position favoring Borer's view. Furthermore, we propose a compositional analysis of Chinese classifiers, differentiating them in terms of the presence/absence of quantification, individuation and classification functions. We argue that the dichotomy of count classifiers and mass classifiers as proposed by Cheng and Sybesma (1998, 1999, 2005) under-represents the similarities and differences between subtypes of classifiers, and critically assess their arguments for the existence of a grammatical count-mass distinction in Chinese.

The thesis explores the quantification and individuation functions of classifiers by investigating how Mandarin-speaking children aged between three and six years old interpret nouns preceded by individual classifiers and container classifiers, corresponding to count-classifiers and mass classifiers respectively in Cheng and Sybesma's taxonomy. Three cross-sectional experiments were conducted using a picture verification method. The results show that the quantification and individuation functions of classifiers are not developed in a parallel way in children. On the one hand, children as young as three years old understood the quantification function of both types of classifiers. They were sensitive to the number distinction in the interpretation of bare nouns and classifier-bearing nominals. They also understood that the default number interpretation of the classifier-noun structure in the absence of a numeral is unitary. On the other hand, however, the mastery of the individuation function of individual classifiers was much delayed. Unlike older children aged between five and six and a half years old, younger children aged between three and a half to five years old antithetically accepted partial object situations and substance situations across the board.



Our findings invite us to propose The Early Lack of Noun Individuation Hypothesis, i.e., Children are not born with noun individuation based on ontological properties of nouns; instead, they come to attain noun individuation through the learning of the individuation function of linguistic forms (for Chinese children, the individual classifiers). Cross-linguistically, this study sheds light on how a functional category (classifiers) and its syntactic context cue the child to the quantificational and individuation properties of nouns, lending support to a syntax-first approach to the acquisition of the count-mass distinction, and casting doubt on the psychological reality of a syntactic count-mass distinction at the level of classifiers.

Title: Speech Rhythm Development in a Balanced Cantonese-English Child

Abstract:

This in-depth case study investigates speech rhythm development in a Cantonese-English balanced bilingual child acquiring both languages simultaneously from birth. The data of the bilingual child came from the Child Language Data Exchange System (CHILDES), and both quantitative and qualitative data were analyzed.

Quantitatively, the study measures the rhythm of the child at two ages, (3;0.15) (years; months.days) and (4;2.0). Several speech rhythm metrics were used to gauge the phonological development of the child in her two languages, including Varco C, V and S; Pairwise Variability Indices (PVI); Percent V (%V) and Delta C, V and S (Δ C, Δ V, Δ S). A total of 80 utterances—20 utterances per language and per age—were measured and compared between languages and ages. The utterances of the child are also compared to utterances of monolingual English- and Cantonese-speaking children at the same ages. Several of the quantitative results suggest cross-linguistic influence between the bilingual child's languages, and rhythmic development that is distinct from her monolingual peers. The results also indicate a greater rhythmic separation between the child's language at age 4;2.0 than at 3;0.15. The most robust and consistent rhythm metrics were %V, PVI_V, PVI_S, Varco V and Varco S.

Qualitatively, this study investigates the bilingual child's word borrowing from English to Cantonese. Between the ages of 3;0.26 and 4;6.8, there were a number of parallel utterances of the same word on the same day in each language. These pairs of words are investigated impressionistically and compared to each other. The phonological adaptation of the borrowed words is discussed with regard to the implications for speech rhythm acquisition and the metalinguistic awareness of the child.

Abstract:

前人的研究和笔者的调查分析表明,勾漏片粤语普遍存在连读变调现象。勾漏片粤语两字组的后字通常不变调,前字声调为中平(或中降)和低平(或低降)时通常也不变调,其他调值的声调在前字位置一般都会发生连读变调,其主要变调规律是:阴调类声调变成较低的中平或中降调,阳调类声调变成更低的低平或低降调。勾漏片粤语的连读变调受轻重节奏律制约,这种模式的形成应该是受到壮侗语的影响所致。

「香港語言學學會粵語語言學傑出學生論文獎」,是香港語言學學會(LSHK)為了鼓勵學生從事粵語研究而設的一個獎項。參賽者必須是本科生或研究生,在報名前已經入學、或將於2010年7月31日或以前入學。只有香港語言學學會的會員才有資格參加比賽。非會員的參賽者請準備在赴會時辦理入會的手續。

「香港語言學學會粵語語言學傑出學生論文獎比賽」(以下簡稱「比賽」),是國際粵方言研討會其中一個環節,每年舉行一次。徵稿通知由香港語言學學會的執行委員會(以下簡稱「本會」)發出,截止日期會比國際粵方言研討會一般摘要的截止日期為早。參賽者需要向本會提交一份不超過十五頁的論文全文,中英皆可。參賽的論文,必須是未經出版、或未曾接受出版(包括論文集)的論文。以往的得獎者,將不能再次參加比賽。曾提交參加比賽的論文,也不能再次提交。

所有提交論文獎比賽的作品,都經由本會委任的評審專家作評審,選出最多五位(一般是二至四位)的入圍參賽者,並安排在國際粵方言研討會論文獎比賽的環節上、在評判團前作口頭報告**(評審委員會有作最後決定、以及決定有沒有入圍者的權力)。論文獎得獎者將在大會上宣佈,並頒贈證書及 港幣一千五百元。

** 請注意: 參賽者不會收到任何形式的資助, 例如註冊費、住宿、交通等資助。

參賽要求:

a. 參賽者必須為大學本科生或研究生(文學碩士、哲學碩士或哲學博士),在報名前已經入學、或將於2010年7月31日或以前入學。參賽的論文必須是原創的和未經發表的研究。論文的長度不能超過十五頁,字體為12號,頁邊空白為一英吋,中英皆可。

b. 參賽者需要提交一篇單一作者的全文(含MSWord檔及pdf檔,不要寫上作者的姓名及單位)、以及在另一份文件中提供下列資料的表格:(1) 作者姓名;(2) 所屬單位及所修讀的課程;(3) 參賽論文的題目;(4) 通訊地址及電郵地址。提交論文時,請同時附上學生證明文件的掃描本(學生證或入學通知的複印本)。

The LSHK Award for Outstanding Student Paper on Cantonese

Deadline for Submissions: July 31, 2010

Conference Dates: December 16-18, 2010

The LSHK Award for Outstanding Student Paper on Cantonese Linguistics competition is an innovative attempt by the Linguistic Society of Hong Kong (LSHK) to promote, recognize, and encourage scholarship by students to conduct research on Cantonese linguistics. Current undergraduate or postgraduate students, registered by the time of submission or by 31 July 2010, are eligible to compete for the Award. Only members of the LSHK are eligible to participate in the competition; non-members must be prepared to join the LSHK at the time of participation.

The LSHK Award for Outstanding Student Paper on Cantonese Linguistics competition is held once a year in conjunction with the International Conference on Cantonese and Yue Dialects. A call for papers is issued by the Executive Committee of the LSHK, normally with a deadline earlier than the usual conference abstract deadline. Participants are each required to submit a full paper of not more than 15 pages in length, either in Chinese or in English, to the Executive Committee of the LSHK. All submissions for the LSHK Award for Outstanding Student Paper must be original papers



that have not been published, or accepted for publication including proceedings. Previous award winners are not allowed to re-enter the competition. The same paper cannot be re-submitted.

All papers submitted for the LSHK Award for Outstanding Student Paper on Cantonese Linguistics competition are subject to review by a Review Committee appointed by the Executive Committee of the LSHK. A maximum of 5 (normally 2-4) finalists may be selected to make an oral presentation at a special session during the International Conference on Cantonese and Yue Dialects organized for this purpose, before a Panel of Judges.** (The Review Committee of any given year reserves the right to make the final decision and may also recommend that no finalist be invited.) The author of the best paper selected by the Panel will be honored during the International Conference on Cantonese and Yue Dialects and presented with an Award Certificate and HK\$1,500.

*** Please note that no extra subsidy including travel subsidy will be provided.

Requirements

- a. Current undergraduate or postgraduate (MA/MPhil/PhD) students, registered by the time of submission or by 31 July 2010, are eligible to compete for the Award. Papers submitted must represent original and unpublished research. The length of the paper should not exceed 15 pages with font size point 12 throughout and 1-inch margin all around and can be in Chinese or English.
- b. Candidates are required to submit one single-authored full paper (without the author's name and in both MSWord and pdf formats) and a separate sheet with the following information: (1) name of the author, (2) institutional affiliation and programme undertaking, (3) the title of the paper, and (4) correspondence and e-mail addresses.
- c. Paper submissions, together with the information and document mentioned in (b) above, should reach the LSHK at lshk.linguists@gmail.com in the form of email attachments on or before 31 July 2010. All submissions will be confirmed upon receipt by the Executive Committee of the LSHK via e-mail.

(1) Topic

Any outstanding thesis which contributes to any area in linguistics will be considered.

(2) Category

There are three categories:

M.A. thesis (awarded within the academic year of 2009/2010) M.Phil. thesis (awarded within the academic year of 2009/2010) Ph.D. thesis (awarded within the academic year of 2009/2010)

Note:

"Awarded within the academic year of 2009/2010" is defined as follows: the student must have the final copy of his/her thesis submitted to the graduate school or the university (for MPhil and PhD theses) and submitted to and approved by the department (for MA theses) during the period from 1 October 2009 to 31 August 2010.

(3) Eligibility

Only students enrolled at local tertiary education institutions are eligible. The Chief Supervisor must be a regular staff member at a local tertiary education institution and an LSHK member to be eligible to nominate his/her students. The nomination must be made by the Chief Supervisor. No supervisor should submit more than one nomination per category in any year.

(4) Procedure

Please submit two hard copies and a soft copy of the thesis for review. The supervisor should ensure that the nominee, if awarded, agrees to give a presentation of the thesis at the 2010 Annual Research Forum of the Linguistic Society of Hong Kong on December 4, 2010.

(5) Submission Methods

The 2009 Annual Research Forum of the Linguistic Society of Hong Kong (LSHK-ARF 2009)

The 2009 Annual Research Forum of the Linguistic Society of Hong Kong (LSHK-ARF 2009) was held in the Hong Kong Institute of Education on December 12, 2010.

The opening remarks were given by Dr. Sam Leung on behalf of the host. This was followed by the presentation ceremony of the Outstanding Thesis Award and the reports made by two awardees. For the MA category, the awardee was Mr. Donand Timothy White from the Chinese University of Hong Kong, with the title of his thesis "Speech Rhythm Development in a Balanced Cantonese-English Child"; for the MPhil category, the awardee was Ms. Aijun Huang from the Chinese University of Hong Kong, with the title of her thesis "Count-mass Distinction and the Acquisition of Classifiers in Mandarin-speaking Children".

Professor Chris Kennedy from the University of Chicago was invited to deliver keynote speech in the Forum. The title of his presentation was "Serving the Degree Argument from the Adjective".

31 papers were presented in 11 sessions, with presenters from universities in Hong Kong, mainland China, Japan, the Netherlands, UK and US. The presented papers covered a wide range of topics, including syntax, semantics, pragmatics, phonetics, phonology as well as L1 and L2 acquisition, with examples and evidences drawing from languages like Modern Standard Chinese, Cantonese, Old Chinese, Tangut, Japanese, French and English.

Public Lecture 'What is Theoretical Linguistics?'

Abstract:

Most human beings have one or more complex systems of (largely unconscious) linguistic knowledge. Theoretical linguistics is first and foremost an attempt to understand these systems, which Chomsky calls I-languages. It is concerned with exactly what form I-languages take and with how much they may vary. It looks especially at how words are combined to form sentences (syntax), how words and sentences are pronounced (phonology) and what meanings they can convey (semantics), but it also considers how I-languages are acquired and how they are used. From this perspective speech and writing are not language but the results of using some I-language, while languages in the ordinary sense are sets of broadly similar I-languages.

Theoretical linguistics is sometimes contrasted with descriptive linguistics and applied linguistics. Descriptive linguistics aims at relatively informal descriptions of linguistic phenomena with little concern with general issues whereas the general issues are central for theoretical linguistics. However, there is no sharp division between theoretical and description linguistics and each should benefit from the other. Applied linguistics on the other hand is often an investigation of a range of language related matters with little real connection with theoretical linguistics.

Within theoretical linguistics there is no consensus about what form I-languages take or with how much they may vary. However, it is clear that I-languages are considerably more complex than speakers are inclined to think, and much has been done to identify the nature of the complexity.

Thus, there are major unresolved issues here, but thanks to work in theoretical linguistics we know much more about linguistic phenomena than we did fifty years ago, from which non-linguists may benefit.

About the speaker:

Bob Borsley was an undergraduate at the University of Wales Bangor and did his Ph.D. at the University of Edinburgh. His research interests are in syntactic theory (especially Head-driven Phrase Structure Grammar), and the syntax of Welsh and Polish. In the 1970s he worked at Adam Mickiewicz University, Poznań, Poland. Then after jobs in University College London, the IBM UK Scientific Centre in Winchester, and University College Dublin, he worked at the University of Wales Bangor from 1986 to 2000, and he became a Professor in 1997. Since 2000 he has been a Professor of Linguistics at the University of Essex. He is the author of *Syntactic Theory: A Unified Approach* (Edward Arnold, 1991/1999), *Modern Phrase Structure Grammar* (Blackwell, 1996),

Welsh Negation and Grammatical Theory (University of Wales Press, 2005) (with Bob Morris Jones), and *The Syntax of Welsh* (Cambridge University Press. 2007) (with Maggie Tallerman and David Willis). He is editor of *The Nature and Function of Syntactic Categories* (Academic Press, 2000) and co-editor (with Ian Roberts) of *The Syntax of the Celtic Languages* (Cambridge University Press, 1996) and (with Adam Przepiórkowski of *Slavic in Head-driven Phrase Structure Grammar* (CSLI, 1999). He is also an editor of *Journal of Linguistics*, the journal of the Linguistics Association of Great Britain.

Obituaries

Professor Li FANG 方立教授 (1942-2010)



It was with great sadness that I learned of the passing away of Professor Fang Li of Beijing Language and Culture University on Sunday, April 11, 2010.

Professor Fang has made tremendous contributions to the education of formal linguists in China. He is one of the very few linguists in China with a deep knowledge of non-transformational

models of generative grammar and Montague semantics. Professor Fang devoted all his life to the propagation of ideas of formal linguistics, his books on logical semantics and mathematical linguistics being seminal publications on these topics in China.

In his writings, Professor Fang introduced to the Chinese linguistics world the main tenets of the interface theory of Arnold Zwicky and Geoffrey Pullum, Head-driven Phrase Structure Grammar, and Montague semantics. By keeping alive a critical discussion of non-transformational approaches to the formal study of language, which have all along attracted little attention among Chinese linguists, he has deepened our understanding of the essentials of mainstream generative grammar. Professor Fang shared with us his insights on the analysis of 'lian...dou', modals and scope of negation. He is one of the very few theoretical linguists in China who has taken the psycholinguistic implications of generative grammar seriously, and moved headstrong into language acquisition research. He was steadfast and unswerving in his conviction in nativism, coming at it from the perspective of semantic universals.

Professor Fang was a most conscientious teacher and taught with an indefatigable spirit. He insisted on giving his students a comprehensive and systematic education in formal grammar, offering courses on Montague grammar, HPSG, GB and minimalism. The range of the courses he offered was remarkable, and remains so even today, even in comparison to the advanced linguistics course being offered in Hong Kong



universities. Under his influence, many of Professor Fang's students have gone on to become active generative linguists in their own right making important contributions to the field.

I first met Professor Fang in 1990 at a conference in Shanghai. Since then, we've engaged in many dialogues on language and shared similar visions on how to promote formal linguistics in China.



He visited and lectured at Chinese University of Hong Kong a couple of times, once in winter of 1996, and then later in the summer of 2006. He also visited City University of Hong Kong in April of 2002 when I taught there.

Professor Fang kindly provided an opportunity for me to teach a short term at BLCU when I left CUHK in 1999, and many colleagues who we know today -- Fan Li, Song Gang, Yang Ning -- were master's or doctoral students of his back then.

Professor Fang led the BLCU group of the Beijing Chinese Early Language Acquisition (BJCELA) project, and kindly and generously supported me in all my research efforts wherever I was, in Hong Kong, Hunan or Beijing. In the two Yuelu conferences in Formal linguistics and Language acquisition Professor Ning Chunyan and I organized in changsha, Professor Fang Li came and presented papers with his students. In the numerous work meetings we held in Beijing from 2001 to 2006, Professor Fang always came in support despite his hectic schedule.



As many of us who met and worked with him know, Professor Fang is a gentleman and a most affable personage, always supportive and appreciative of the efforts of young researchers. While he is 10 years my senior and has no doubt experienced life in greater depth and complexity than I, there are a lot of things we shared, not just about linguistics, but about China and the world, social and human relations, life and friendship.

Professor Fang does not always express his views explicitly, but through his mild but weighty remarks, he shared with me a lot of his concerns, his insights and his wisdom, as scholar and friend.

I still remember with warmth and fondness the many hours we chatted smoking together, in walks and coffee chats, in Beijing, Changsha and Hong Kong. It's with a deep sense of pain and loss that I can now only have such pleasures of his friendship through his writings and in my recollections.

Professor Shikai ZHAO 趙世開教授 (1926-2010)

Professor Zhao Shikai, who left us on May 1, 2010, is remembered by many of us in Hong Kong as a veteran linguist who has played a major role in bringing theories of Western linguistics to the Chinese mainland, in particular in the years immediately after the Cultural Revolution.



Born in 1926, Professor Zhao Shikai was a native of Shanghai and received his high school education in Tsing Hua Middle School during the war years. In the late 1940s, he studied at Wuhan University majoring in English language and literature, taught by the Harvard-educated literary scholar Wu Mi (§3), who had a lasting intellectual influence on him. Professor Zhao was one of the few linguists I know of who received both an undergraduate training in English and one in Chinese. From 1957 to 1960, he studied Linguistics at the Chinese department of Peking University under Professor Gao Mingkai.

Professor Zhao was posted to the People's Liberation Army between 1950 and 1957 as a teacher and interpreter, with a brief stint in North Korea. He joined the Institute of Linguistics of the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences in 1961, and worked at the Linguistics Abroad unit there until his retirement.



Professor Zhao was perhaps the first PRC linguist to research on the history of American Linguistics comprehensively, resulting in his 1989 book *A concise history of American Linguistics*, still a classic reference and the only monograph in Chinese that I know of on the subject. In this text, he gave a succinct and systematic introduction to the ideas of Boas, Sapir, Bloomfield, Harris and Chomsky. He was modest enough to admit the inadequacies of his own research, and outlined the stringent standards that a Chinese linguistics historian will have to meet in future research of this type.

English in the areas of empty categories and anaphora, and has thought deeply and worked extensively on Chinese translations of modern linguistics terminology. In 1979, he published with Professor Liu Yongquan *An English-Chinese glossary of Linguistic Terms*, a delightfully handy and useful reference tool for standard Chinese linguistics terms. In the years when he was editor-in-chief of the journal Linguistics Abroad (國外語字), 1985-1989, he started a small column in the journal giving his translations and explanations of selected western linguistic terms, some of which we still struggle with today. Among those he touched on in the issues of 1989-90 were: *cohesion*, *performative/constative*, *theme/rheme*, *valency*, *deixis*, *barriers*, *X-bar*, *filters*, *constraints*, *trace*, *scope*, and *mapping*. In the last ten years, Professor Zhao has been carrying out a project revising and updating the 1979 glossary, which I hope can be published posthumously at some point.



Professor Zhao visited Hong Kong a number of times. He presented papers at the 1988 Wu dialect conference held at CUHK and the 1990 LSHK conference on the Teaching of Linguistics in Chinese communities held at HKBU. He visited the Department of English of CUHK in 1994 and HKU in 1999. I can still remember with vividness

the lectures on Bloomfield that Professor Zhao gave at CUHK in 1994 to a joint group of linguistics and philosophy students, in which he brought to life the human dynamics of the story of Jack and Jill, which I had previously understood mechanically and literally as nothing but a boring behaviorist illustration of a model of human communication.

I first met Professor Zhao at the Second Harbin Conference held at Heilongjiang University in 1987. Conversations with him since have always been intellectual pleasures. Listening to his personal reflections on linguistic scholarship, and the many enticing anecdotes he enjoyed sharing about veteran scholars ranging from Wu Mi to Gao Mingkai, I learned much about the history of linguistic research in twentieth century China, and about the sociology of knowledge. Professor Zhao has always held an open heart toward the ideas of western civilization, and always welcomed advances in interdisciplinary approaches to the study of Chinese language.

In the present era of global capitalism, in which everything is integrated into the world of corporate finance and material gains, I was impressed with the bold and unequivocal statement Professor Zhao made to a group of young graduate students in a talk he gave in 2006 at Beijing Foreign Language University, to the effect that scholarship is strictly incompatible with the pursuit of material wealth. I don't know if this is an anachronistic statement, but if it were, it would be a lovely anachronistic truth that I would not tire of reminding my graduate students of.

At a personal level, many linguist friends and I consider Professor Zhao a paradigm example of the Jiangnan (江南) intellectual, warm, gentle and graceful in his manners,



always decently dressed, even in times of difficulty and hardship. He was perhaps unique in having an incessantly youthful mind and heart, always willing to share with young people not only his successes, but also his pitfalls and weaknesses, with frankness and honesty. To me, he is a Morrie Schwartz of contemporary Chinese academia, and will always be so in my memory, as scholar, teacher, mentor and friend.
